Expanding Test-and-Treat through SB 1214 would empower pharmacists to apply their clinical expertise, ensuring timely and effective care for Arizonans when and where they need it most.

When this bill is heard in your committee, we strongly encourage your aye vote of SB 1214. By doing so, you will help advance a proven, patient-centered solution that improves healthcare access and outcomes across the state.
