Re: S.B. 1509_SD1 - Relating to Prescription Drugs

Dear Chair Takayama and Vice Chair Keohokapu-Lee:

On behalf of our members operating in Hawai'i, the National Association of Chain Drug Stores (NACDS) is writing to provide comments for the record in **support** of S.B. 1509_SD1, relating to prescription drugs. The legislation would curb unfair and anticompetitive-like business practices that enrich pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) at the expense of patients and their pharmacies.

S.B. 1509_SD1 includes important reforms creating a pharmacy reimbursement rate floor equating to the National Average Drug Acquisition Cost (NADAC) plus the HI Medicaid Fee-For-Service Professional Dispensing Fee. Additionally, this bill would prohibit a PBM from offering reimbursement rates or incentives to a non-affiliated pharmacy in an amount less than those offered to an affiliated pharmacy for providing the same prescription drug. The bill also requires:

- health insurers and PBMs to reduce an enrollee's defined cost sharing for a prescription drug by a price amount equal to at least one hundred percent of all rebates received, or to be received, in connection with the dispensing or administration of the prescription drug; and
- a PBM to submit a certification to the Insurance Commissioner by January 1 of each calendar year certifying compliance with the cost sharing requirements.

Finally, the bill establishes protections for the publishing of certain confidential or proprietary information by health insurers, PBMs, or plan sponsors that perform health care or administrative services on behalf of a health insurer or PBM.

Altogether, the PBM reforms encompassed in this bill are needed to protect pharmacy providers from the abusive PBM business practices that can jeopardize the future of pharmacy as well as the sustainability of providing pharmacy services and ultimately patient access to care. The public relies on neighborhood pharmacies for important healthcare services.
